

Igbo Language Beginners Class: 3-Month Lesson Plan

Month 1: Introduction to Igbo Language and Basic Communication

Week 1: Introduction to Igbo Language

Month 1: Introduction to Igbo Language and Basic Vocabulary

Week 1: Introduction to Igbo Culture and Language
